With this concern in mind, Mr. Tanghe is proposing an amendment to the City Charter, specifically to repeal the current millage and replace it with 4 mills for fire protection and EMS operations.

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Auburn Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, held in the Council Chambers at 1827 N. Squirrel Road, Auburn Hills, Michigan, 48326, at 7:00 p.m. on the 16th day of March, 2026.

The following resolution was offered by Councilperson Moniz and seconded by Councilperson Verbeke.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Home Rule City Act, Act 279, of the Public Acts of Michigan, of 1909, as amended, an amendment to the Auburn Hills City Charter may be proposed by the City Council of the City of Auburn Hills on a three-fifths (3/5) vote of the members elect; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that it is appropriate to submit a Charter Amendment to the electors of the City of Auburn Hills at a City election to be held on August 4, 2026.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the Auburn Hills City Council as follows:

1. The following proposition is approved and shall be submitted to the electors of the City of Auburn Hills at the City election to be held in the City of Auburn Hills on August 4, 2026:

BALLOT QUESTION

A proposed amendment to Section 7.5 (Adoption of budget, tax limit) of the City of Auburn Hills City Charter

Shall Section 7.5 of the City of Auburn Hills Charter be amended to authorize a new tax rate levy of up to 4 mills (\$4 per \$1,000.00 taxable value), without limitation as to duration, starting with the December 2026 levy and raising approximately \$8,894,659.00 in the first year for the purposes of providing funds for operations and capital expenses for Fire Protection, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), and Advanced Life Support (ALS) services for the City of Auburn Hills?

2. Section 7.5 of the Auburn Hills City Charter currently reads as follows:

Sec. 7.5. Adoption of budget, tax limit.

Not later than the first Monday in November, the council shall adopt the budget for the next fiscal year and shall provide, by resolution, for a levy of the amount necessary to be raised by taxation for municipal purposes, which, for library purposes shall not be more than one (1) mill, for fire purposes, shall not be less than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) mill, nor more than two and one-half ($2\frac{1}{2}$) mills, and for police purposes, not less than six (6) mills, nor more than eight and one-half ($8\frac{1}{2}$) mills and for the general fund, not less than one (1) mill, nor more than three (3) mills, and for the purposes of constructing, improving, rehabilitating, repairing and maintaining City public roads, not more than one and one-half ($1\frac{1}{2}$) mills.

3. Under the proposed Charter Amendment, Section 7.5 of the Auburn Hills City Charter would read as follows:

Sec. 7.5. Adoption of budget, tax limit.

Not later than the first Monday in November, the council shall adopt the budget for the next fiscal year and shall provide, by resolution, for a levy of the amount necessary to be raised by taxation for municipal purposes, which, for library purposes shall not be more than one (1) mill, for Fire Protection, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), and Advanced Life Support (ALS) services, shall not be less than one-half ($\frac{1}{2}$) mill nor more than four (4) mills, and for police purposes, not less than six (6) mills nor more than eight and one-half ($8\frac{1}{2}$) mills and for the general fund, not less than one (1) mill nor more than three (3) mills, and for the purposes of constructing, improving, rehabilitating, repairing and maintaining City public roads, not more than one and one-half ($1\frac{1}{2}$) mills. Any additional millage approved by the electors of the City for Fire Protection, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), and Advanced Life Support (ALS) services, in an amount not to exceed four (4) mills, shall be in addition to the millage limits otherwise set forth herein and shall increase the aggregate charter millage limitation by a corresponding amount.

4. The City Clerk is hereby directed to do all things necessary to provide for the submission of the aforesaid proposition to the electors of the City of Auburn Hills at the August Primary Election to be held on August 4, 2026.
5. A copy of this Resolution and copies of the proposed Charter Amendment (with the current Section 7.5 of the Charter) and Ballot Question shall be submitted to the Governor and Michigan Attorney General for approval as required by law.
6. The proposed Charter Amendment (with the current Section 7.5 of the Charter) and Ballot Question shall be published and posted in accordance with the Home Rule City Act and other applicable state law.

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Auburn Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, held in the Council Chambers at 1827 N. Squirrel Road, Auburn Hills, Michigan 48326, at 7:00 p.m. on the 16th day of March, 2026, the following resolution was offered by Councilperson Moniz and supported by Councilperson Ferguson:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Auburn Hills has determined that it is necessary and in the best interests of the public health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the City to provide continued and enhanced funding for Fire Protection, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), and Advanced Life Support (ALS) services; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to submit to the qualified electors of the City a ballot proposal authorizing the levy of a new millage to repeal and replace the current millage for such services; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the proposed ballot language complies with applicable provisions of Michigan law, including the Michigan General Property Tax Act, MCL 211.24f; and

WHEREAS, the City Council intends that the ballot language be submitted to the electors without modification.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. The City Council hereby approves the following ballot language exactly as set forth below and directs that it be submitted to the electors of the City of Auburn Hills at the August Primary Election to be held on August 4, 2026:

**CITY OF AUBURN HILLS MILLAGE FOR FIRE
PROTECTION, EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES, AND
ADVANCED LIFE SUPPORT SERVICES**

Shall the City of Auburn Hills impose a new millage on taxable property of up to 4.00 mills (\$4.00 per \$1,000 of state taxable value) without limitation as to duration, as authorized and approved by the City of Auburn Hills Amended Charter, which is proposed to replace the currently levied 2.49 mills, for the purpose of providing funds for operations and capital expenses for Fire Protection, Emergency Medical Services (EMS), and Advanced Life Support (ALS) services for the City of Auburn Hills?

If approved, the new millage shall be levied in lieu of and to replace the previously voted millage, for operations and capital expenses for fire protection, which, after the required rollback, last resulted in a levy of 2.49 mills. The new millage of 4.00 mills will commence in 2027 and continue each year thereafter. It is estimated that this millage will raise approximately \$8,894,659.00 in its first year if approved and levied. A property with a taxable value of \$100,000 would be taxed up to \$400.00 for the millage. If the proposed new millage is not approved by the voters, the millage currently levied at 2.49 mills, and approved at 2.50 mills by voters in 2016, shall remain in effect and continue to be levied. By operation of Michigan law, a portion of the millage revenue may be captured and disbursed to the following local units of government authorized to receive tax increment revenues: The Auburn Hills Downtown Development Authority, The Auburn Hills Tax Increment Finance Authority, and The City of Auburn Hills Brownfield Redevelopment Authority.

2. The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to submit the approved ballot language and all required certification documents to the Oakland County Clerk in accordance with the Michigan Election Law and all applicable deadlines for the August Primary Election.

3. The Mayor, City Manager, City Clerk, and City Attorney are authorized to take any and all actions necessary or convenient to carry out the intent of this Resolution and to comply with state election requirements.

By operation of Michigan law, a portion of the millage revenue may be captured and disbursed to the following local units of government authorized to receive tax increment revenues: The Auburn Hills Downtown Development Authority, The Auburn Hills Tax Increment Finance Authority, and The City of Auburn Hills Brownfield Redevelopment Authority.
